- 2007: Wrote the fund proposal for Project Boaz
 to PC USA
- 2008: Received Syracuse University's Martin
 Jan Luther King Jr. Unsung Hero Award
- 2008: Started Boaz Computer Classes
 June
- 2008: Was offered Social Justice and Compassion
 Nov Grant from 2009 to 2011 from the General
 Assembly
- 2009: Began English tutoring
 Feb
- 2010: Held 1st Lodi Mission (Vision Summer Camp
 Jun for refugee and under privileged children
 in Syracuse).
- 2010: A short film titled "What Happened To My
 Oct Next Door" was produced based on the
 Project Boaz, which was rewarded an
 award from the Pan Pacific Film Festival in
 California.
- 2013: Received YWCA Academy of Diversity
 Achiever's Award
- 2015: Received Martin Luther King Jr. Youth
 Unsung Hero Award

- 2007: Zhou was baptized. [China]
 Aug
- 2008: The first computer class began with 21
 students in the Summer. [North Korea,
 Nepal, Bhutan, Burundi]
- 2009: Krishna was offered an office Job. Parsu
 and Narayan began studying nursing.
 [Bhutan]
- 2009: Guru, Ramesh and Ramesh's mother were
 Nov baptized. [Bhutan]
- 2010: Refugees and under privileged children
 were served by Boaz Spring and Fall
 semesters. [Congo, Nepal, Bhutan,
 Burundi, Myanmar and U.S.]
- 2010: The first Summer Vacation Bible School,
 July Lodi Summer Camp, began. 121 students
 attended and 43 children accepted Jesus as
 their Savior. [From more than 10 countries]
- 2010: Nightingale received an A from her English
 Dec class. [Myanmar]
- 2011: Zhou graduated from a Seminary
 May [China]
- 2011: Zhou served Chinese Church in Flushing,
 NY [China]
- 2015: 6th Lodi Summer Camp. 133 students
 attended and 69 children accepted Jesus as
 their Savior. [From 10 countries]

Some Boaz students entered Onondaga
 Community College and Syracuse
 University.

Since 2007,

The Boaz Project and the Lodi Summer
 Camp have served a total of about 860
 refugees from 25 countries.
